I was reminded last week that it was time to write another article for the Clan Hunter newsletter and I thought to myself, "No problem! I just got an email from the Scotsman about DNA and Scottish history. All I need to do is a little research and I'll whip up an article about DNA research."

HA! That seemed so simple. It turns out that the email from the Scotsman was about DNA Day, which is April 25<sup>th</sup> in appreciation of Francis Crick and James D. Watson who published a paper on April 25<sup>th</sup> 1953 about the discovery of the structure of the DNA molecule. Well, that's great, but hardly worth an article.

Never mind, I'll just do my own research about DNA. So I went to the DNA Scotland website. If you are at all interested in DNA research, this website is very well laid out, easy to navigate and very well written. But after half an hour of skimming through, I was no further forward. I now know that men can do a YDNA test (which researches the paternal line) or a mtDNA test (which

researches the maternal line), but women can only do the mtDNA test. You can even do a test to find out if you carry the red-hair gene. Did you know that you can pass on the redhair gene to your children even if you don't have red-hair yourself! But after all that, I'm still not sure what your DNA results tell you. After a further half hour of scanning, and learning some more interesting information about this research, I finally stumbled across the answer I was looking for: "By having your DNA tested we can inform you of the markers you carry and what we think they mean. Further to this, our historians will expand on the science to create a holistic understanding of your ancestors' lives in the deep past."

So while genealogists start with today and work backwards, by using DNA scientists are able to track "markers" and look into the distant past. Each person's DNA is made up of 6 billion letters. You inherit 3 billion from your father and 3 billion from your mother, but as they are passed down over generations, tiny errors are made. Strangely, each error (called a marker) seems to be made consistently in a certain part of the world, so by tracking the markers they can track the geography of the DNA. Kind of cool. eh?

Did you Know That ....

The Celts made several different beauty preparations from natural materials. They mixed stale urine and wood-ash to make a kind of soap. Slaked lime (made by burning crushed limestone) was also mixed with water to bleach and stiffen their hair. They also made a deep blue dye to paint patterns on their skin from woad, a plant related to flax.

George Hunter -Canadian Documentary Photographer (1921–10 April 2013)

George Hunter is a Canadian documentary photographer who spent seven decades capturing industrial and landscape scenes on film. He was born in Regina, Saskatchewan, and started

taking photographs professionally for the newspapers like the Winnipeg Tribune. He worked for the Tribune during World War II. He also worked for the National Film Board of Canada (NFB) in the 1940s. After the war, he turned to freelance work. One of his main stylistic features is the use of aerial photography, since he was also an airplane pilot.

He was one of the first photographers to be accepted into the Royal Canadian Academy of the Arts and is a founding member of the Canadian Heritage Photography Foundation. Three of his images graced the Canadian five, ten, fifty dollar bills. One of his photographs of Toronto's Pearson International Airport was

included as part the Voyager II spaceprobe's time capsule. The Canadian Association of Photographers and Illustrators gave him a lifetime achievement award in 2001.

Likely his most high-profile work appeared in TIME magazine in the mid-1950s, when his work on American landscapes, photographed at dusk were

> highlighted in the 20 September 1954 issue's 12article page entitled "The U.S. After Dark." His work is represented in collections nationwide. including more than one hundred works at the Canadian Museum Contemporary


Photography. He lived his later years in his home/studio located in Mississauga, Ontario. Hunter died in Mississauga's Credit Valley Hospital on 10 April 2013, aged 92
