

Did You Know?

- The Braemar Gathering held every September in Aberdeenshire is considered the most prestigious Games in the world as it is attended by members of the Royal Family every year. Queen Elizabeth II only missed four games during her 70-year reign and was the longest serving Royal to be a member of the Braemar Royal Highland Society.
- Looking for an interesting competition not usually found elsewhere? Look no further than the Alaska Scottish Highland Games which includes a Salmon Toss!
- The Ceres Highland Games held each June in Fife is the oldest free games in Scotland and began under a Charter awarded by Robert the Bruce in recognition of the villager's support at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314.
- The largest event in terms of athletics is the Cowal Highland Gathering (in Argyll Scotland) which boasts upwards of 3,500 athletes competing.
- The largest event in terms of spectators is the Scottish Highland Gathering and Games hosted by the Caledonian Club of San Francisco held in Pleasanton, CA every year. It boasted nearly 50,000 spectators in 2015! Similarly, they are also the oldest games in the U.S. and are celebrating 157 years in 2023.
- The Royal Scottish Highland Games Association which is the governing body of events in Scotland requires all competitors in Heavy athletics to wear kilts.
- Highland Dancing used to be an all-male event as it was once an act of warriors imitating epic deeds from Scottish folklore. Today it is more than 95% female.

Scottish Recipes—Mince & Tatties

Ingredients

Mince:

- 1 lb (454 gr) extra lean ground beef
- 1 medium yellow onion, finely chopped
- 2 medium garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tbsp cornstarch
- 1/4 cup dry red wine
- 1 cup beef broth (I use OXO Beef and I use 2 small packages (4.5 grams each) per 1 cup of water)
- 2 medium carrots, peeled and chopped into small pieces (around 5 cm)
- 1 cup fresh, canned or frozen peas
- 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce

Potatoes:

- 4 large russet potatoes, peeled and cut into quarters
- 2 medium dried bay leaves (optional)
- 1 tsp kosher salt
- 2 tbsp unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup whole milk
- 1/2 tsp fresh ground black pepper

Instructions

Mince:

- 1. Brown beef in a large skillet over medium-high heat, breaking meat up with a wooden spoon if necessary. Once beef starts to brown add onions to the skillet. Cook for a few minutes until vegetables start to soften, but not brown. Add garlic and cook stirring for 1-2 minutes. Add wine and deglaze pan by scraping the bottom with spoon. Allow wine to reduce and evaporate by more than half.
- 2. Sprinkle cornstarch over beef and vegetables, and stir to fully coat ingredients (and avoid any cornstarch lumps).
- 3. Slowly add beef broth, starting with a tablespoon or two and gradually increasing quantity. Once broth is added, bring pot to a boil and reduce heat to low.
- 4. Simmer, uncovered for about 20 minutes, until sauce has thickened and reduced slightly. Add carrots, peas and Worcestershire sauce. Cook for 15-20 minutes, until carrots have reached desired tenderness.
- 5. Season lightly with salt and pepper.

Potatoes:

- 1. Meanwhile, place potatoes and bay leaves (if using) into a large sauce pan and cover with 2-3" of cold water. Add 1 tsp of salt and bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat to a strong simmer and cook for around 20-25 minutes until tender.
- 2. Drain water and let potatoes air dry in the strainer (do not rinse!). Add milk and butter to pan and cook over low heat until butter has melted and milk has warmed. Return potatoes to mean with milk and butter and mash until desired consistency has been reached. Season with salt and pepper

Assembly:

1. Serve mince over tatties and garnish with chopped fresh parsley if desired.
