It is so exciting learning about Scottish heritage! As Christmas began to approach, I wanted to add a Scottish twist to my celebrations. Starting small this year with little steps, I searched for some gifting and entertainment ideas. I discovered there are a lot of Scottish traditions!

In searching for a Scottish gift idea for our Deputy Clan Officer, Dale Hill and his mom, Susan Hill. I really wanted to find something that tied into all we have been learning about Scotland. Off to the internet I went. What better way to bring Scotland to Canada than through a Scottish subscription box. The 'Wee Box' is packed and shipped from the Scottish homeland. Each box contains approximately 5 items that are locally sourced and only sold in Scotland. The box I purchased was called the "Scottish Christmas Spirit Wee Box." You may not know this yet, but Dale absolutely loves celebrating all holidays year round. He decks his house out to the hilt in decorations and trees for the Christmas Holidays. I knew this was the perfect box for him. Each 'Wee Box' supports local Scottish businesses and they give back to local charities including, The Prince and Princess of Wales Hospice, The Prince's Trust, GlasglowLife and Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance. They are very conscious of their environmental footprint as there is very little packaging and the postage bags are 100% compostable. The company is also working towards being completely carbon neutral.





Let's take a look inside the purple 'Wee Box' that

arrived on my doorstep from Edinburgh. The items were wrapped in a recent newspaper. Inside the box contained a tartan tweed stocking from Earth Squared, a really beautiful and soft Cashmere tartan scarf from Couthie gifts, Christmas cranberry round shortbread cookies made by Your Piece, a tartan tree ornament craft project including a kilt pin and a Christmas print to frame. It was so fun waiting for this special gift to arrive and then to see what surprises were inside. Overall, it was a great experience, the box was approximately \$60.00 CAD plus shipping. The products were all good quality and packed well for the long journey. The 'Wee Box' company sent emails to let me know when it was sent along with tracking information. It arrived quite quickly from Scotland. I was amazed! They have monthly subscription boxes all with different themes including Robbie Burns and February's theme is "From Edinburgh with Love," or they have one time gift boxes that can be purchased from their website such as "Iconic Scotland", "Outlander-Inspired", etc... The 'Wee Box' website is, (www.weebox.co.uk) Just as they say, they hope the box will "gie' you a wee grin!"

For the first time we officially celebrated Scottish Haud Hogmanay, Scottish New Year. To kick off the evening, we watched Madam Pauline's inspiring message to Clan Hunter and then watched the Canadian Scottish celebration "Hogman-Eh! '21 Reconnect & Rejoice hosted by the Scottish Society of Ottawa." This was live streamed with a variety of performances including, bag piping, poetry and musical selections. Two highlights were the Red Hot Chili Pipers and the host performing an original version of "Auld Lang Syne". It was so melodic and moving and had a true taste of a Scottish folk song.
