

The Selkirk Grace

The following article was taken from a book on Scottish Toasts and Graces by Charles MacLean

Some hae meat, and canna eat, And some wad eat that want it, But we hae meat, and we can eat -And sae the Lord be thankit.

Robert Burns

This grace takes its name from a person, Dunbar Douglas, 4th Earl of Selkirk, rather than the town in the Scottish Borders.

In fact, Robert Burns only visited Selkirk once. He was touring with a companion, and arrived at Selkirk on Sunday 13th May 1787. It was raining hard, so they took shelter in Veitch s Inn, where the local doctor and two friends were sitting by the fire.

The innkeeper asked if the strangers could join them, but the doctor refused, on the grounds that 'they did not look like gentlemen'.

Three days later, Dr Clarkson learned who the stranger was: a contemporary, James Hogg, wrote that "his refusal [to allow them to join him] hangs about the doctor's heart like a dead weight to this day, and will do 'til the day of his death, for the bard had no more enthusiastic an admirer."

The grace itself was probably


first delivered at the Heid Inn in Kirkcudbright High Street, in the presence of Lord Selkirk, in July 1794 (the inn is now named the Selkirk Arms). It is also possible that this, Burns' most famous toast, was traditional, and not in fact composed by him after all. He certainly never wrote it down.

Hunter History

The Chief Prevents a Murder Robert Hunter of Hunterston, the 17th Chief of Clan Hunter, whom we nick-name "Queen Mary's Man", stepped in to save a local man from being murdered. In his day the Register of the Privy Council of Scotland recorded all legal actions of any consequence throughout the whole of Scotland, especially those involving nobles, lairds, prelates, and others of stature in society. This ancient record shows that a certain Andrew Sempill made an attempt in July 1577 to kill the Reverend Alexander Callendar, "minister of Goddis word" at the kirk of Largs, which is close by Hunterston, in Ayrshire. In fact he attempted "maist cruellie" to shoot him with a pistol upon the Green of Largs. On that

occasion, the first of three murderous attacks, David Boyle, one of his friends who was present, managed to prevent his "wickit purpois", and the Minister escaped with his life. However, the quarrelsome and violent Andrew Sempill continued to harass the Minister, and on 23 October he was reported to have been still in his "wickit and ungodlie mynd". He went to the Minister's dwelling place, "and with ane drawin swerd wald have slayne him". However, Sempill did not succeed, and "be Goddis providence he wes stayed be Robert Hunter of Hunterstoun". The Hunter Chief was the second saviour of this persecuted clergyman. The attacks continued, and on the 5th of November the Minister had to be rescued yet again, this time by David Fairlie of that Ilk, and William Craufurd of Drumsey; the Privy Council became involved, and Sempill was denounced a rebel to His Majesty, being "put to the horn" with three blasts of a horn at the market cross of the local burgh. Such were the violent and quarrelsome times, in which the Chief of Clan Hunter played a Godly and a peaceful role
