



Adelaide Hunter Hoodless

Adelaide Hunter Hoodless was born in 1857 and as a young wife decided that there was more to life than looking after a house. She started the Women's Institute in Stoney Creek in 1857 to give a focus to her local neighbours and to promote the feeling that together they could contribute to the success of the community.



She campaigned for schools to teach motherhood and management courses. She also helped found the National YWCA and the Victorian

Order of Nurses. Definitely a woman well ahead of her time.

In May '2000 Tom and I were privileged to attend a reunion of the descendants of Adelaide Hunter Hoodless. Tom was invited to attend in his official capacity as Clan Officer for Canada of Clan Hunter. He was asked to give a few words of welcome and asked to talk about 'the Clan'.

It was a beautiful day and the reunion was held at the old homestead in Burlington—a lovely setting. As part of the activities, we were invited to

take a tour of the homestead and also to check out their family tree. It was nice for us to meet some old friends there from the Hunter Clan whose family tree appeared to cross that of Adelaide. There was lots of discussion around the genealogy table about who came from which brother and how all the families were linked. This family tree started with Joseph Hunter, born in 1773 in Ireland. Adelaide was one of his grandchildren. Genealogy was discussed at great lengths and finally, after the

An Apology to Adam and Heather



A Celebration of History and Highland Spirit

On September 15, 1773 an old Dutch cargo ship, well past her prime, arrived in Pictou Harbour. In her hold "200 tons burthen" were 33 families, 25 single men, their agent and a bagpiper. These children of Scotland were carried forth on this voyage by a decision to leave their homeland. Inextricable from the memory of all onboard was the image of Scottish retreat, which they were continuing 25 years after the Battle of Culloden. The voyage had been much longer than expected, and lives had been lost. Blown many weeks off course it seemed even fate was against their heavy-hearted decision. These families clung only to the knowledge that they were fleeing more than physical hunger, they were fleeing from a famine of spirit. Indeed, life in Scotland had become insufferable. To bow to a distant monarch was a reality that could be shirked in their hearts. To lose their land was a great burden to be endured. But there could be no denying the pain borne by the removal of their tartans and their pipes, for these were the essence of a Highlander.

In Canada, today, the re-construction of the Ship Hector stands as a tribute to the courage and determination of these individuals who, in the face of great odds, left an indelible mark on this place. The Ship Hector Millennium Project serves also as a symbol of journey and discovery for all people who have made the decision to leave homeland and begin anew.

Sunday 13th August, 2000
Wellington County Museum*

Present: Tom Hunter, Christine Hunter, Mel, Cindy & Crys Hunter, Dr. Nadene Hunter, Wally Hunter, Nadene B. Hunter, Don & Marian Hunter and their grandchildren Adam & Heather Cridland, Bob & Aldene Hunter, Paul, Jane Ann & Adair Hunter, Lizz & Andrew Thibodeau, Lynn (Hunter), Al, Thomas & Christina Ball, Sharon & Al Chicoine and Mark & Julie Nykamp.

Our gathering & meeting was called to order by our clan officer, Tom Hunter, who welcomed all, at 1:00 PM., and we started with a set of tunes played on the pipes by Mel Hunter. Crys Hunter played the Hunters' March on her violin and Lizz Thibodeau played a tune for us on her violin. The Gaels made a welcome reappearance and sang a selection of songs (Shoals, Coulter's Candy & Dark Island). There were a good number present (the youngest was Paul and Jane-Anne's son Adair), and regrets from Joe and Fran Hunter, who were unable to stay for the meeting after the Kirkin'. They were to meet Joe's daughter, Mandy, in Michigan that evening for dinner and had to miss the gathering. Tom announced that Clan Hunter had won the Best Tent award at the Montreal games last weekend. This makes the third year running that we have taken prizes for our tent. In 1998 we took third place at Ancaster and last year we took first prize at Fergus. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved on a motion by Mel, seconded by Dr. Nadene. Under old business, the membership cards have been done and are being distributed as people pay their dues. Our membership application hasn't been modified yet. Tom will take care of this. There has been no feedback at all on the French version of the newsletter so we won't pursue it any further at this time. A letter to delinquent members asking for a contribution to continue the newsletter will be sent out. These people will still be members but will NOT receive the newsletter if they don't make a contribution. We just can't afford to continue to pay for free newsletters and postage.

A draft of our Constitution & Bylaws booklet was presented for our approval. It will include a directory of members. On a motion by Don, seconded by Andrew, there will be a statement that the directory is NOT to be used for solicitation purposes. Carried.. Tom wants to add to the history that there are two trains of thought on our ancestry and all going back to William Ventor. Paul moved and Andrew seconded a motion to print the booklet. On a motion by Jane Ann, seconded by Mel, it was agreed not to include the Family Tree since one is sent from Scotland when people join. This was carried. Andrew moved and Lizz seconded a motion to include the Family Tree in our tent display at the various games. Carried. Mel moved and Christine seconded that we add to the booklet a section on Highland Dress. Carried. Last year we agreed to have T-shirts made up with the castle embroidered on them. They have been made and are very good looking. There are still a few left and Christine is taking orders. They are green with an embroidered picture of Hunterston on the left breast. The shirts are also available in blue. Let Christine know your preference. We did subscribe to the Scottish Studies, as discussed at the last meeting. They have sent information on a Scottish sailing cruise on Lake Ontario from Toronto on the Empire Sandy. Don has fliers for anyone who is interested. Our Web page is now fully bilingual, thanks to Lizz. It has a human click, like instant messaging, with Tom on the English side and Lizz on the French side. It has also been updated and animation and music have been added. It was noted that at least two memberships have come from the site. The membership form can be downloaded. Don presented a report on the treasury, which was distributed to all present in printed form. On a motion by Don and seconded by Bob, the report was accepted as presented. There was no genealogy report this time. Catherine Elder has sent notice that she is no longer able to continue as genealogist. A letter will be sent accepting, with regret, her resignation. Paul suggested that it would be nice to present her with a gift, a tangible "thank you" for her years of service in this job. Paul moved and Dr. Nadene seconded the motion that we give a retirement gift to

Catherine. Carried. Christine & Tom and Lizz & Andrew will take care of finding an appropriate gift. We need a volunteer for someone to fill Catherine's place and Mel Hunter was appointed. He will need all our help and will be in contact with Catherine. The Hunters' Halloo continues. Information trickles into Tom's lap on genealogy etc. but he still needs input. It was suggest that we add American games, especially those held in wintertime, to the newsletter.

Don has information on the Toronto Heritage Ball on Saturday October 28th. It is \$45.00 per person for the dinner and Ball, with the last Wednesday in September as the deadline for signing up. See Don if you're interested.

It was noted that we need to operate in compliance with our own rules, as stated in our by-laws. We have never officially elected officers for this group and our rules say that we must. Notice and call for nominations for office will go out in the April Newsletter. This will give the required 60 day prior notice before our meeting and election. There was a proposal put forth to invite our Clan Chief back to visit. Tom read letters from Pauline. She will be spending more time and energy on Hunterston and will be calling on officers to help in the restoration. Nigel has left Hunterston to tend to his own property. Pauline needs our opinions on the plans for restoration of the castle and costs/estimates so that the project can be finished in time for the 2001 Gathering. Pauline had to cancel her trip to Australia and New Zealand due to illness, shingles. Andrew moved that we contact Pauline as soon as possible to invite her to Canada for 2002 or 2003 seconded by Crys

There was some discussion on emailing the newsletter. It would have to be text only, no pictures. It was noted though that if it were on the web page, it would be accessible to all, paid up or not. Tom could report on the possibilities in the next newsletter. At this point, cost of printing and postage is not a problem. If we were to put the newsletter on the web page, we would still have to mail out copies for those who do not have computers and because the web page is in both English and French the newsletter would also have to be translated to French.

Mel reported on the Detroit games and asked if there might be a possibility of the US and Canadian associations getting together to arrange for a single subscription so that one would not have to pay both group dues. He also suggested that the two groups exchange newsletters (this is already being done) It was noted that for \$5.00 US /yr. One can get the newsletter. Canada does it and the US could reciprocate. Mel moved, Paul seconded that we confirm this with the US Secretary/Treasurer. Carried. Christine gave us a report on today's lunch. It cost \$200 plus \$240 for facilities. The Association is absorbing the cost for rent this year. Christine moved that the clan pay the balance for today after members pay \$10.00 for lunch (children 6-12 years, half price and under 6 years free). Mel seconded the motion and it was carried.

We can get the same place next year if we need it. Mark and Julie are willing to explore other possibilities for a meeting place next year. Christine moved that we empower them to do this. The motion was seconded by Cindy and carried.

The meeting adjourned on a motion by Andrew and agreed by acclamation.
