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

Why-A "Family Health Tree"? -by Elizabeth M. (Hunter) Wall

More and more as I scan the newsletters and journals coming in from Genealogical Societies, I find articles on creating a Family Health Tree. I am sure many of you must ask **WHY?** Well perhaps my experience might help you to understand **WHY!**

Ten years ago, I remember very little about the period between June 20 and August 14. Although unaware of it, I had developed a brain cyst which was putting pressure on the spinal cord at the base of the brain.

Visits to the doctor determined

that I was suffering from a <u>lack of</u> <u>Vitamin B12.</u> So a course of shots was begun to correct this problem.

It didn't help at all and my husband and family became more and more convinced as they read all they could lay their hands on that I had either a brain tumor or was in the early stages of Alzheimer's. Neither was very pleasant to think about. Finally after consulting with a friend who also happens to be a doctor, I was sent to see the local neurologist. He immediately sent me to a neurological surgeon in Winnipeg whose diagnosis was death in a very short time.

However, he decided to operate and did. As you can tell I am back to what could be called normal if anyone knows exactly what that word means.

But the end of the story is not there. A few years later while researching my family history, I was surprised to learn that my paternal grandfather had died of the exact same problem at the very same age. However, since it was at the turn of the century, there was not much that could be done for him.

My father had not been affected by the ailment, but I now wonder about my grandchildren. The one good thing about all of this is the fact that at least the family will know in the future what happened in Granddad Hunter's generation and in my generation. Hopefully it won't occur to either of the grandchildren. But then they will have a record of the symptoms to pass on to future family members.

A FAM1LY HEALTH TREE might have helped the Doctors discover what my problem was a little more quickly and perhaps would have given my family a few less

My Search For My Hunter Ancestors

anxious days.

In the April Issue of the Newsletter. I referred to the need for proving dates obtained from newspaper articles etc. To illustrate this, I had been gathering items about my grandfather, Robert Hunter Sr. and also had the details on his tombstone (which I had recently had recut). These all showed Robert Hunter was **born** in 1850.

When my family heard that I was gathering information on our Ancestors, several gave me bits of pieces of paper that they had in their possession. I believe that my grandfather had obtained these items when he was planning to come to Canada. One stated the following "AT KIRKCONNEL THE 24TH DAY OF MAY 1875. IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED THAT ROBERT HUNTER AND AGNES BODDAN BOTH RESIDING IN THE PARISH OF KIRKCONNEL HAVE BEEN PROCLAIMED THREE SEVERAL TIMES IN ORDER TO MARRIAGE IN THE PARISH OF CHURCH KIRKCONNEL AND THAT NO **OBJECTIONS HAVE BEEN** OFFERED, signed WILLIAM KIRKLAND, Session Clerk.

Oh! I thought. They were married in Kirkconnel. Not so.

Another slip of paper came from my oldest brother who had received it from our Aunt Margaret, our father's youngest sister. It stated - "I HEREBY CERTIFY THAT ROBERT HUNTER HAS BEEN MARRIED TO AGNES BODDAN. ΑT CATTER BOG. KILMARONOCK THIS 27TH DAY OF MAY 1875, BY ME signed W.MACKINTOSH, PAR. MIN'R OF BUCHANAN." On this slip of paper there was a large ink spot over the place name, blotting out the middle section.

Since I already knew that my

grandmother AGNES BODDAN came from Ayrshire. I decided it must be KILMARONOCK, which is in Ayrshire. I started writing to New Register House in Scotland. After many letters, in 1986 1 received their marriage certificate. They were indeed married at CATTER BOG, KILMARONOCK. Robert was 23, Agnes was 20. Their parents were, William Hunter and Margaret Hunter. maiden name Kellock. James Boddan and Janet Boddan. maiden name Allan. Another puzzle. Grandfather was 23 in 1875. His birthdate must be 1852

National Registration started in Scotland in 1855 so in order to find his birth record I had to search the Old Parish (or Parocial) Records. I now knew his parents so I ordered in Microfilms at the L.D.S. Library and after many weeks located his birth record - 5th September 1852.

My next step was obtaining Census Records in Scotland to trace his life back to this time, and to also identify his sisters and brothers. The 1861, 1871, showed his age as 9 and 19. Could there be Passenger records when they came to Canada? Yes! They sailed on the S.S.Grecian from Glasgow May 9, 1882. His age was listed as 30. More secondary proofs that he was born in 1852.

Where is CATTER BOG? My Aunt Margaret said it was a CHURCH which was not standing when she was in Scotland in 1928 A number of years were to pass before I found my answer.

In the afternoon at the community hall, Tom Hunter traced our family history back to 1116A.D. through the Lairds of Hunterston.

He explained how our surnames were derived, such as Johns - son or Robert - son.

In time this method became too cumbersome, thus surnames originated.

The Hunter Clan have a new tartan of their own which is not connected with any other clan.

It may be purchased in Scotland or through agencies

"The Gaels", the Hunter family's very talented musical group who performed on TV rendered many Celtic songs in harmony. They accompanied themselves with guitar, violin, flute, keyboard.

A bus trip to visit Honeywood and Horning Mills cemetaries where our ancestors were buried and driving past the former Hunter homestead completed the eventful day.

Flowers were given to anyone wishing to place them on graves by Mrs. Margaret Rawbottom.

A tribute in the form of a plaque was given to John Johnston in appreciation for his work on the Family History Book.

Mrs. Margaret Rawbottom read a poem written by her daughter to commemorate the occasion. Myrna Donner is recognized as a poet of some note.

Hunterian Museum and Art Gallery

Anyone going to Scotland and in particular, Glasgow might be interested in this museum. The Hunterian Museum and Art Gallery takes its name from William Hunter (1718-83), a student at Glasgow University in the 1730s, who later aquired fame and fortune as a physician and medical teacher in London. Hunter bequeathed to the University his substantial collections which included coins, paintings and prints, books and manuscripts, South Seas curiosities, zoological specimens, fossils and minerals, together with anatomical and pathological specimens relating to his medical work.

The Hunterian Museum, opened in 1807, was Scotland's first public museum. There have been many additions since Hunter's time, with an emphasis now on geology, archaeology, coins and art. Since 1980 the University's art collections have been housed in a separate building, The Hunterian Art Gallery
